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INTRODUCTION

1. What are your top three campaign promises or goals, and what action will you take to achieve them if elected?

Promise 1: Address the Housing Crisis by building more units, improving existing structures, and strengthening tenant protections

Promise 2: Restore order and public safety by strengthening police-community relations, and getting guns off our streets

Promise 3: Make NYC more affordable: by making key investments in healthcare, education, and public transportation

2. If elected, what is the first piece of legislation you would introduce? Why is that your top priority? If you are an incumbent, please also state what legislation you have passed which you are most proud of.

If elected, my first legislative priority will be tackling the housing crisis by expanding deeply affordable housing, strengthening tenant protections, and curbing speculative real estate practices. New developments must reflect actual neighborhood incomes, not inflated regional averages. We need stronger enforcement against illegal evictions and landlord harassment to keep families in their homes. Additionally, we must hold landlords accountable for vacant units and predatory practices that drive displacement. Housing is a human right, and I will fight to ensure Harlem and the South Bronx remain affordable for the communities that call them home.

3. In your view, what are the major needs of your district's constituents?

District 8 needs safety, fewer guns, cleaner streets, affordable housing, and good jobs. I have dedicated my life's work to improving police-community relations, and I know first-hand the importance of building trust through accountability, to improve safety and remove illegal guns from our streets. Our neighborhoods deserve cleaner streets and better sanitation services. That means more trash bins, consistent waste pickup, and investments in public spaces to improve quality of life. Affordable, reliable transportation is also essential for economic mobility. I will work to expand transit options, lower fares, and improve service so residents can access jobs and opportunities across the city. Finally, we need more local, good-paying jobs. That means investing in workforce development, supporting small businesses, and ensuring new developments provide employment for the people who live here. I will fight for a safer, cleaner, and more connected District 8, where every resident has the resources and opportunities to thrive.

4. How long have you lived in the district in which you are running, and do you have any achievements or involvement in your neighborhood you are particularly proud of?

District 8 is more than just where I grew up—it's the community that stood by me in the toughest moments of my life, when the entire country was against me. It welcomed me back after I was proven innocent and gave me the chance to rebuild and grow.

My proudest achievement is dedicating my life to advocating for justice and fixing our structurally unequal and flawed justice system. And now I am ready to fully dedicate myself to tackling the real issues my neighbors face every day—housing, safety, jobs, and opportunity. As a Member of City Council, I will bring my national credibility to addressing local issues, making sure no one in our community is left behind again.

I have dedicated my life's work to advocating for police accountability and justice system reform, using my

While I have never been in politics, my years of advocacy have pushed for real reform—fighting against wrongful convictions, calling for greater government transparency, and demanding a system that works for the people, not against them.On the City Council, I will bring that same passion and determination to ensure true accountability and justice for our community.

As a council member, I see myself playing an important role on the ground, acting as a shield for our community against federal instability. The City Council's role is more critical than ever in ensuring that local needs are met and that our residents are protected.

ELECTIONS AND VOTING

Voter turnout in New York City elections is exceptionally low, as they are held "off-cycle" in odd-numbered years. To boost local voter turnout and reduce participation gaps, the Legislature passed and Governor Hochul signed a law that moves county and town elections to even-numbered years, and lawmakers are supporting a constitutional amendment that would do the same for city elections, including New York City's. Citizens Union is <u>leading a coalition</u> of groups advocating to move New York City's elections to even-numbered years, and the City Council is considering a <u>Resolution in support</u> of that shift.

8. The New York City Board of Elections (NYC BOE) has been a source of frustration for voters and candidates for years. The City Council appoints NYC BOE members and has the power to appoint commissioners who are committed to reform, but the most recent commissioners have been appointed behind closed doors. Do you commit to request a public hearing for BOE nominees, and to only vote for individuals who are publicly committed to reducing party-based patronage and supporting open hiring practices?

Having been impacted firsthand by a flawed system, integrity and transparency in my office will be paramount. POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY

17. Who do you think should have the final say on discipline in the New York Police Department? (i.e., Place the final decision with the Police Commissioner; the Civilian Complaint Review Board; the Mayor; the Deputy Mayor for Public Safety; or another individual or entity).

The Deputy Mayor for Public Safety should be in charge of oversight and discipline of the NYPD. That said, the Deputy Mayor should work to build a thoughtful partnership with NYPD leadership. New York's public safety challenges will require collaboration and partnership to help solve, so our approach to public safety should reflect those values.

I have been actively involved in advocating for stronger police accountability and justice system reform, particularly through my work with the Innocence Project. I helped steward crucial legislation alongside Senator Zellnor Myrie, such as the Challenging Wrongful Convictions Act, which seeks to provide a genuine legal pathway to exoneration for those wrongfully convicted. This bill would allow individuals to challenge their convictions, even without DNA evidence, ensure post-conviction discovery, and provide a right to counsel for wrongful conviction claims.

Additionally, I worked on legislation to ban deception in police interrogations, a tactic still legal today that led to the wrongful convictions of me and the other Exonerated Five. The legislation would also ensure that youth under 18 are able to consult with counsel before waiving their Miranda rights, and make it easier for individuals who've pled guilty to challenge their convictions if they believe they were wrongfully prosecuted.

These efforts are part of a larger package of bills aimed at ensuring fairness in the justice system, preventing misconduct, and holding law enforcement accountable for their actions. As a council member, I will continue to push for these reforms at the local level, ensuring that the voices of those impacted by injustice are heard and acted upon.

CHECKS AND BALANCES

I believe the City Council's advice and consent powers should extend to all senior-level Mayoral appointments. While the bill passed in July of last year was a step in the right direction (expanding Council oversight to 20 additional city agency commissioners) it fell short by not requiring Council approval for many other senior-level positions.
